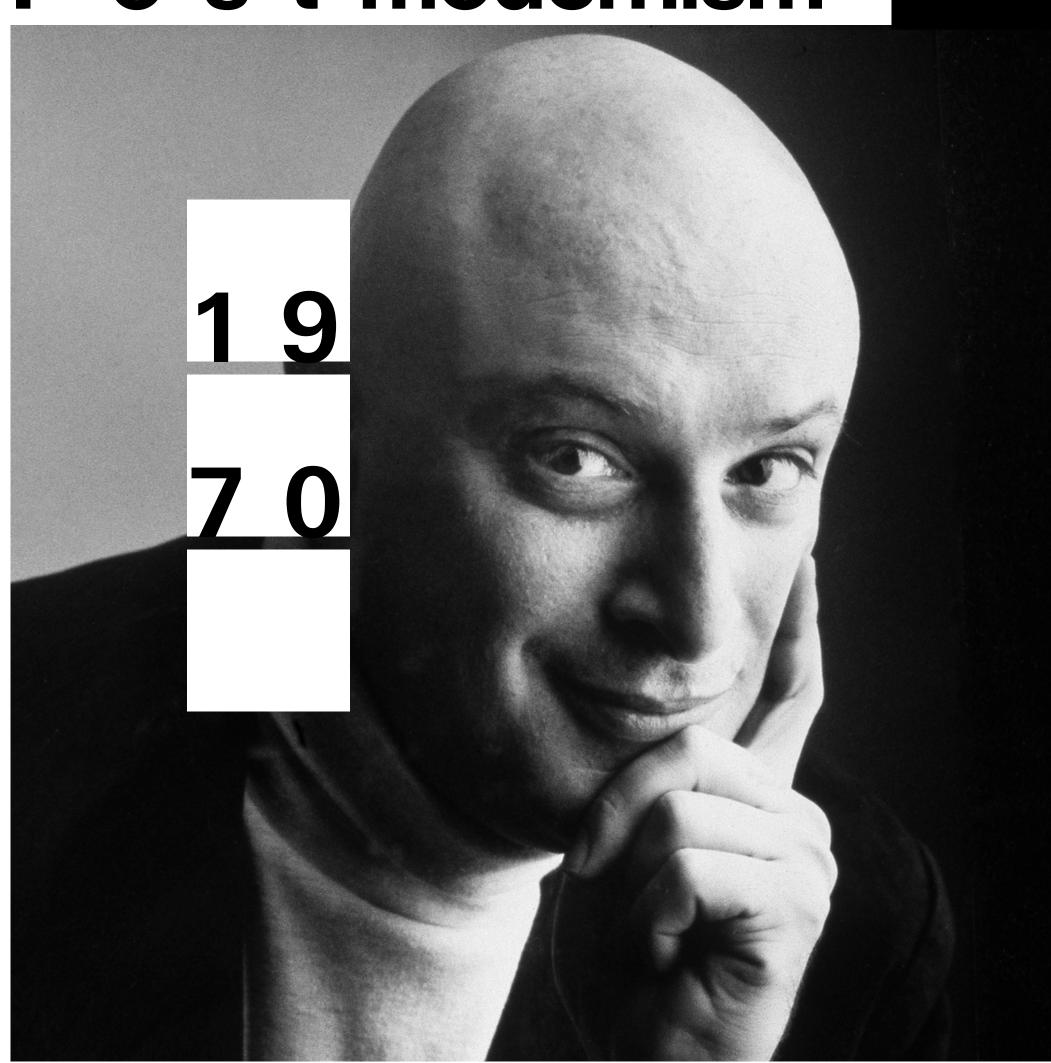
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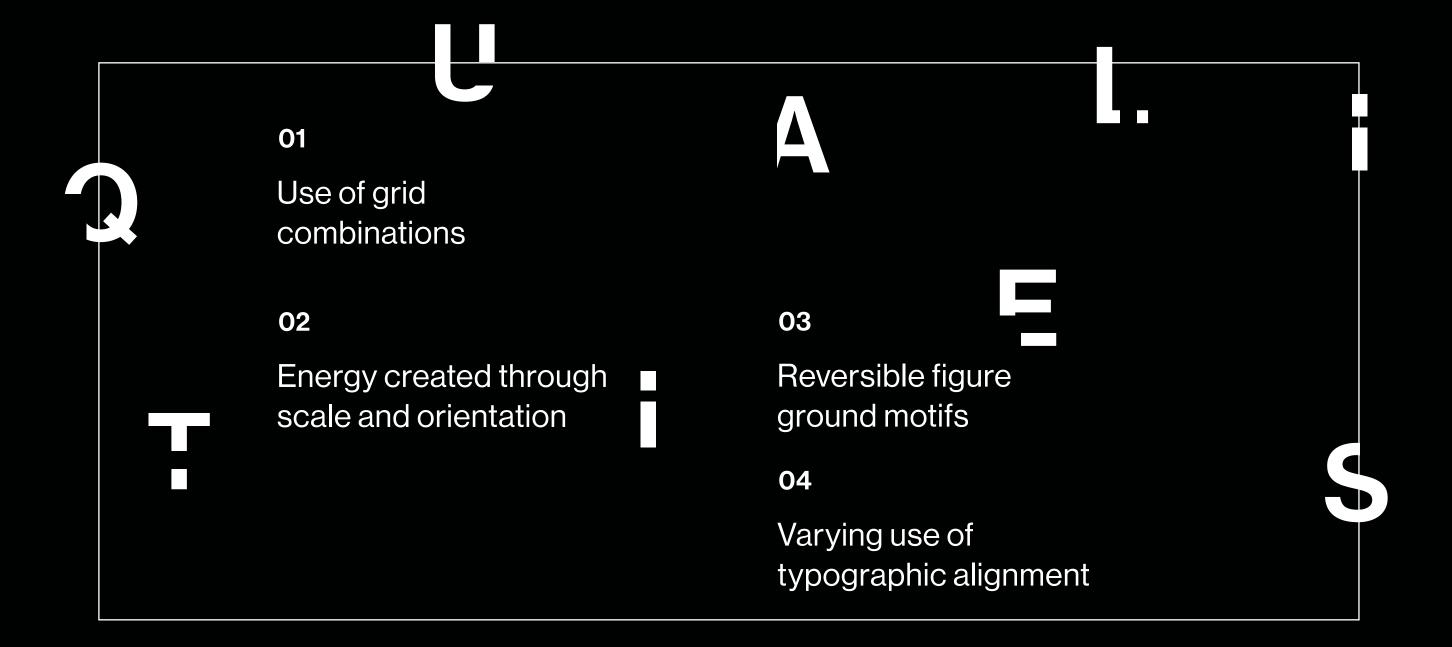

Use of Grid Combinations

Influenced by his mentor, Armin Hofmann, Friedman challenged the strict grid system that is commonly used in Swiss Typography. He begins by laying out the grid and slowly overlaps elements on the lines. Through this technique, he transforms the static grid based typography into a more dynamic composition.



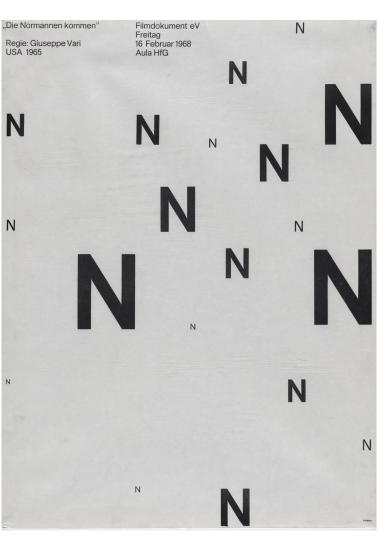




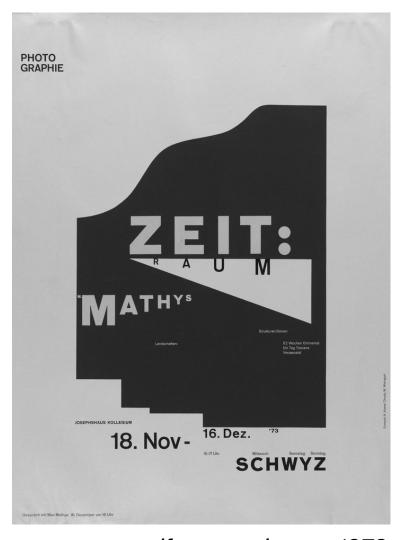

Friedman is a firm believer of legibility and unpredictability (readability). He aims to optimize communication by providing a clear yet engaging message through the use of scale and orientation. As seen in most of his typography works, he creates energy by scaling letters and words, and rotating texts to communicate its meaning.

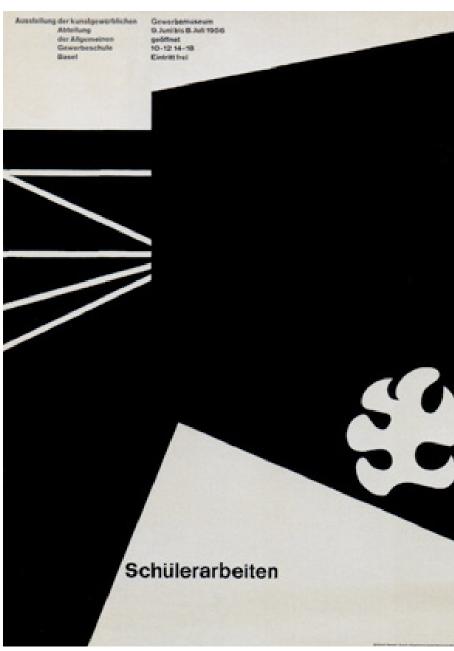

Reversible Figure ground Motifs

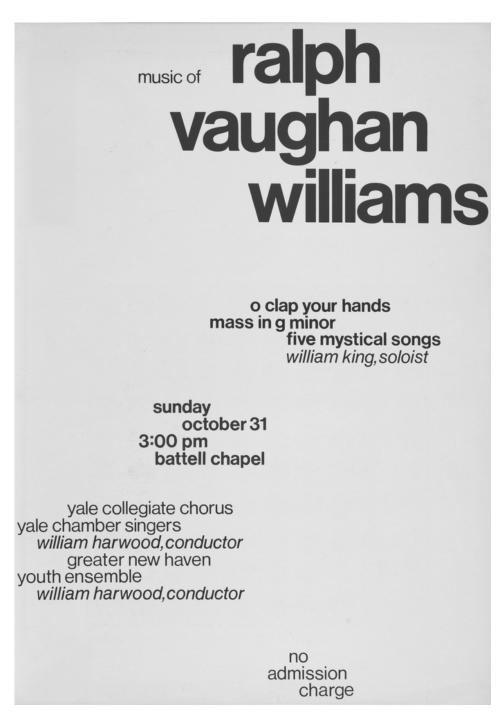
Dan Friedman plays with the interpretation of figure ground to carry and hold the viewer's eyes in the work. The balance between positive and negative spaces attract attention equally and alternately to each other. This quality of Friedman's graphic design expresses deeper layers of meaning and readability to his work.

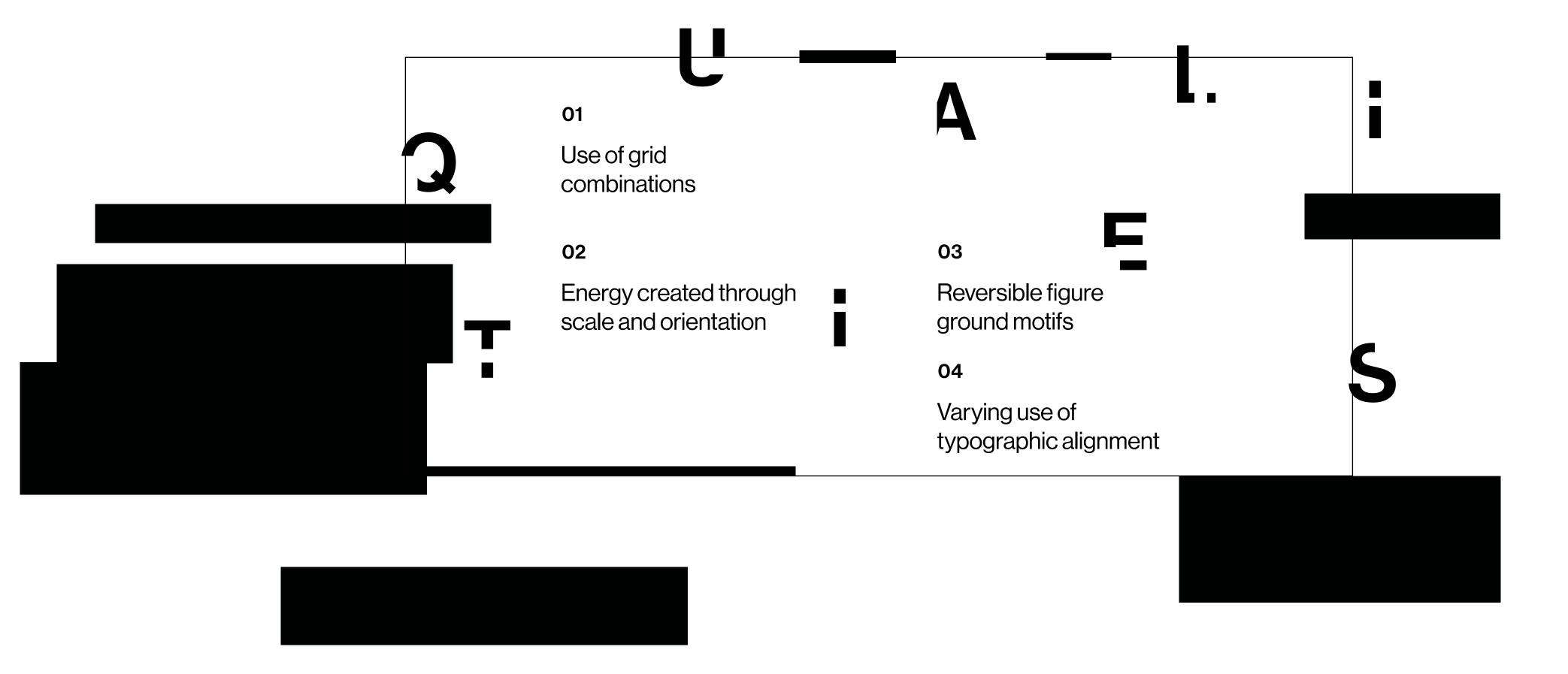
Encompassing all the years he spent as a graphic designer, Friedman uses varying typographic alignments to create categories within the content. Elements that are in relation to each other are either

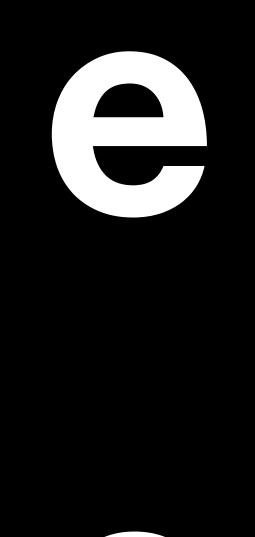
I flushed left,

right, or

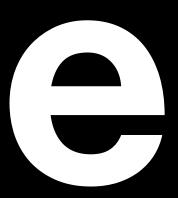
aligned centred.
